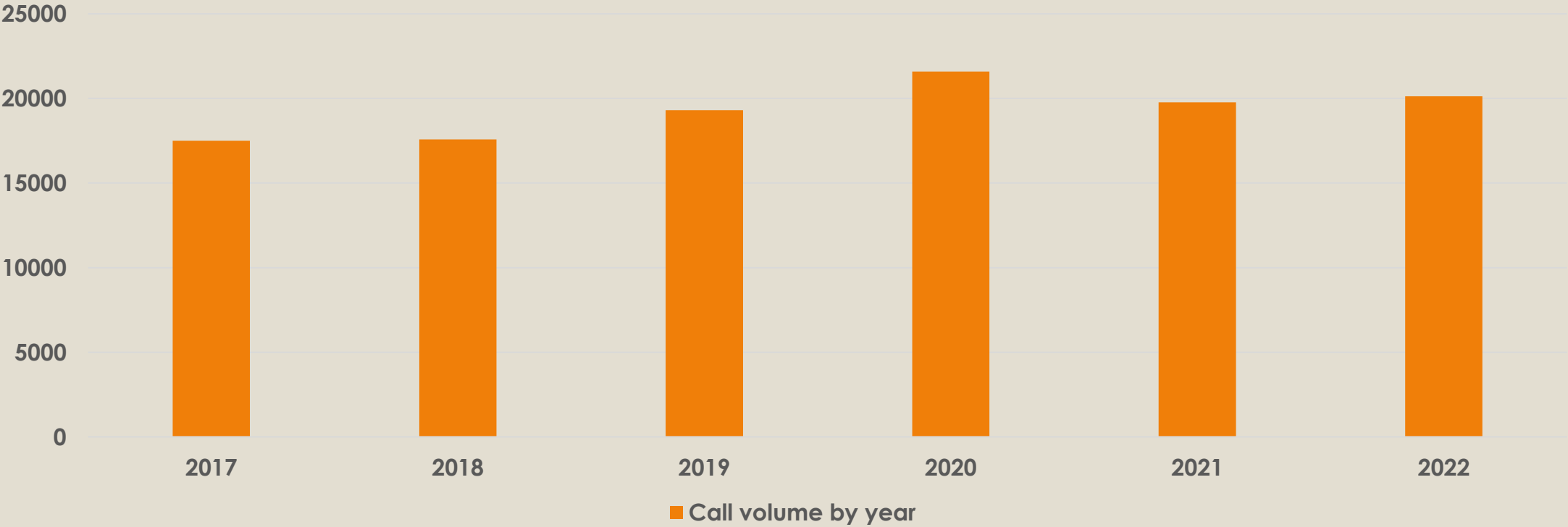

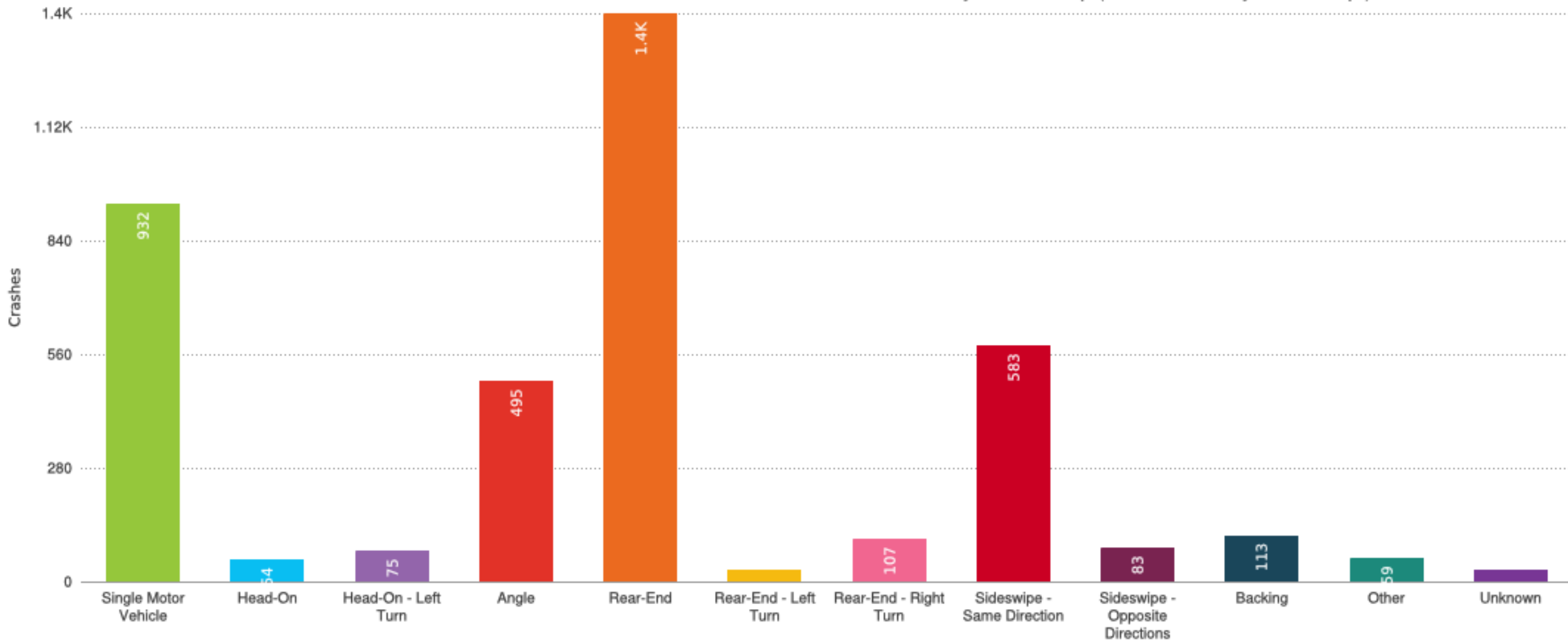

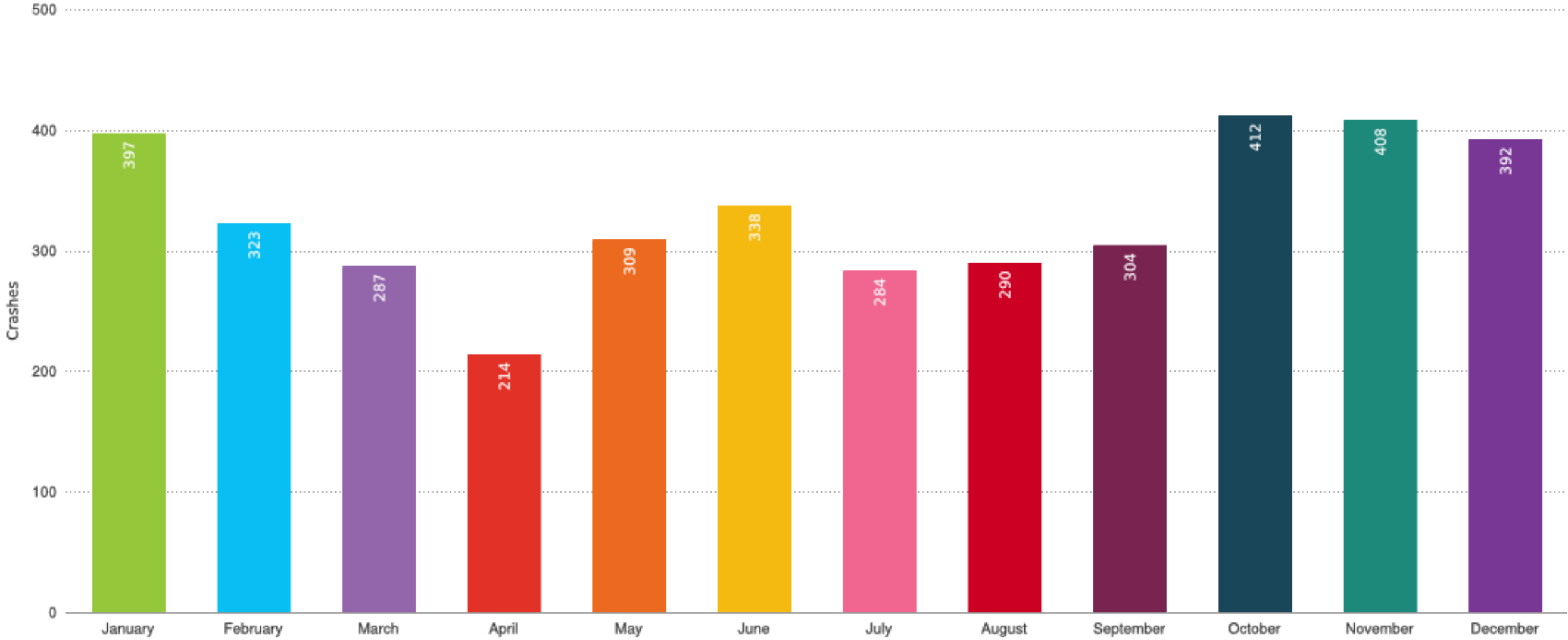
Crash Type

Crashes for the Years 2021 and 2020 and 2019 and 2018 and 2017 for City or Township (Oakland County: Orion Twp.)



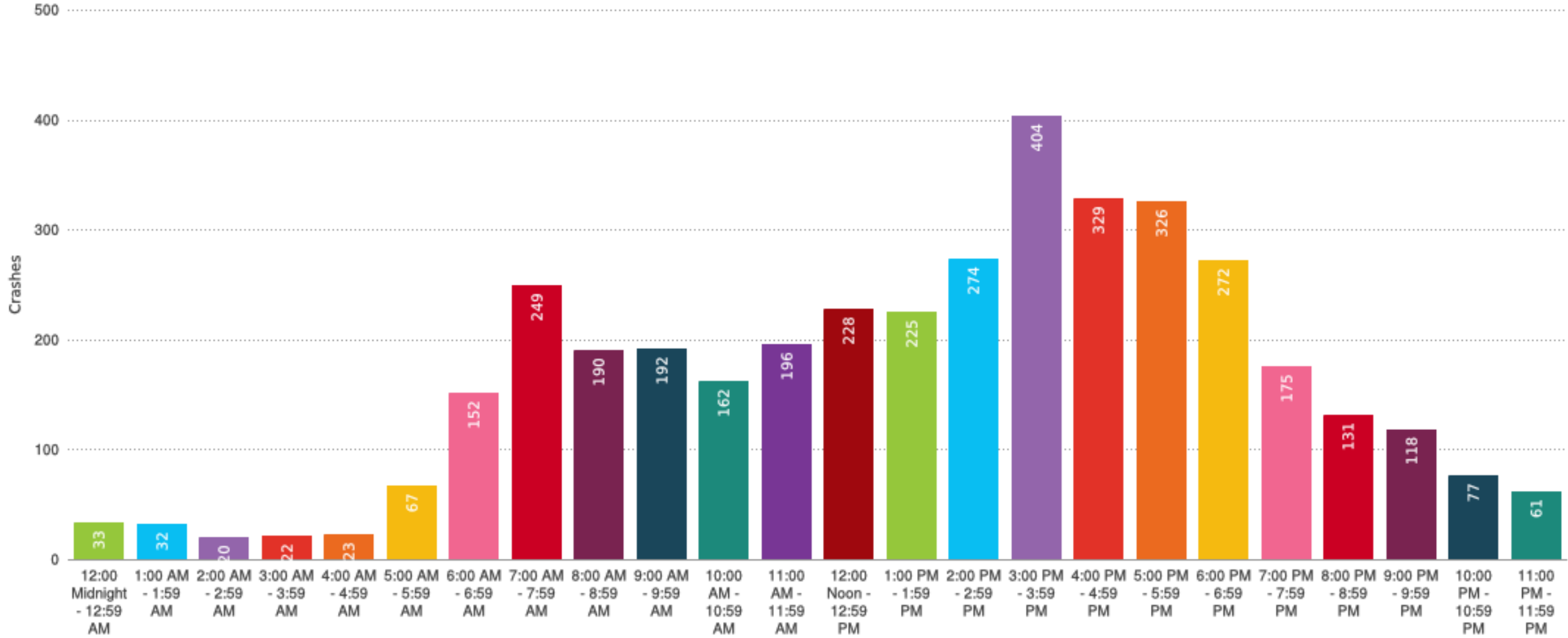
Crash Month

- When in doubt call, we encourage it.

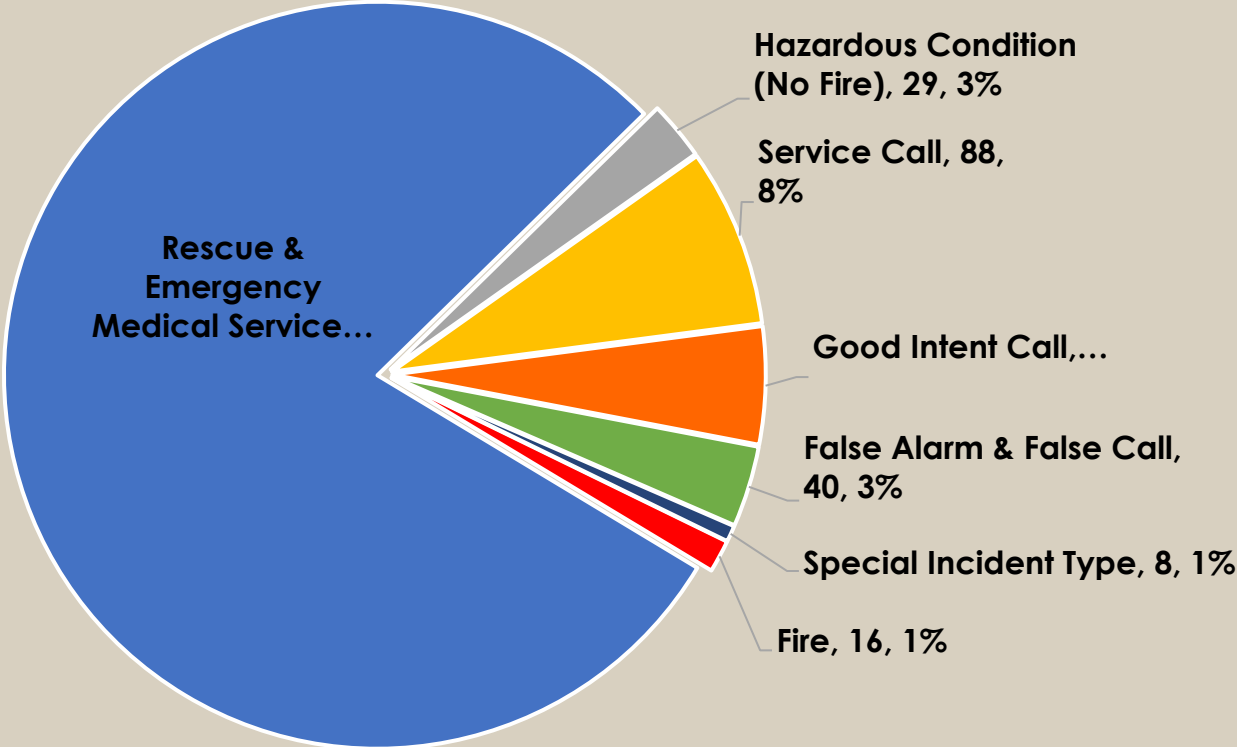

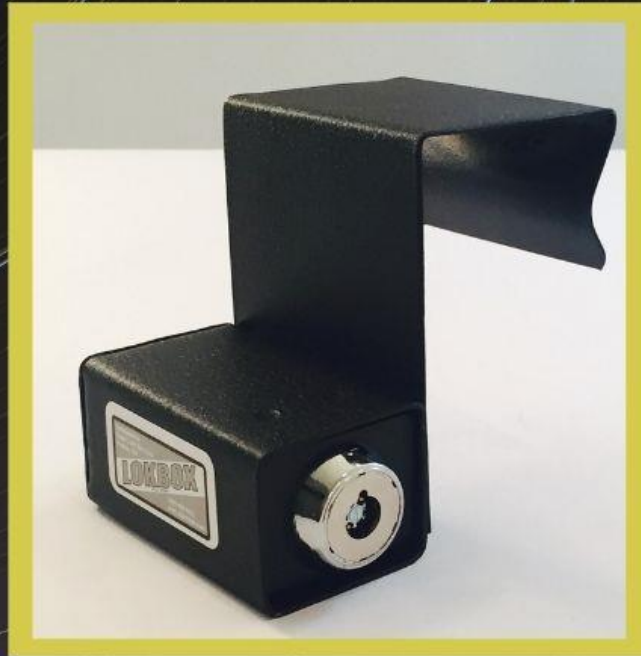

Public Services Update

Summer Watering Restrictions

Mandatory watering restriction in effect from May 1st through September 30th for everyone who is connected to Orion Township water and has an automatic sprinkling system.

The following mandatory watering restrictions shall apply:

| Monday - Saturday: | Watering may only be done between the hours of midnight and 5:00 a.m. |
| Sunday: | Watering may be done at any time |

Watering of any kind may not be done during the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. Monday through Saturday. If the restrictions for Monday through Saturday are not followed, then your water service could be discontinued.

****If your home is connected to Orion Township water, and do not have an automatic sprinkling system (meaning you water your lawn from a hose) please water your lawn between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday.****

Backflow Device Testing

Backflow Devices are installed on water lines to prevent backflows from occurring. There are many types of backflow devices and MDEQ requires testing of these devices at a minimum of every three years.

Residential properties who are required to test this year will receive a letter asking them to have their backflow device tested.

Only licensed plumbing contractors who are ASSE Certified can test, repair, and install backflow assemblies pursuant to State of Michigan Law



What if my irrigation sprinklers are NOT connected to municipal water?

- Underground Irrigation System Affidavit must be completed if:
 - a) An underground irrigation system IS NOT PRESENT at the property or
 - b) An underground irrigation system IS PRESENT at the property but the water source is a WELL OR OTHER WATER SOURCE (the system IS NOT connected to the Charter Township of Orion water supply)

Testing must be completed and form submitted by August 31st

- Test reports must be turned in to our office by mail or email at kgordon@oriontownship.org.

Sewer Jetting

- Normal sewer maintenance and jetting ensures sewer mains remain clear.
- This summer, sewer jetting will be focused on the Southwest side of Orion Township

GIS Mapping

- DPS crews continue to work on mapping curb box locations around the Township.
- Currently, we are mapping in Hills of Indianwood subdivision and will be moving east down Indianwood Road and Marina Pointe. If you notice blue paint and/or flags in your front yard, it is likely that the DPS crew is mapping curb boxes in your neighborhood.

GFL & Garbage Service

Regular Garbage Collection

- Place your garbage and recycling in your Orion Township rolling carts, and set them out by 7:00 a.m. on your collection day. Carts should be removed by 8:00 p.m. that evening.

Holiday shift

- GFL observes the following holidays: Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Memorial Day Independence Day. If a holiday falls on a weekday, collection will be delayed by one day and Saturday will be used.

Yard Waste

- Accepted April 1st – December 15th
- Please clearly mark containers as compost (stickers are available at Township Hall and the Orion Center).
- No limit to the amount of yard waste you may set out each week.

Bulk Items

- Bulk waste (such as appliances and furniture) pick-up will be available each week on your scheduled collection day .

Phragmites

What's the problem with Phragmites?

While *Phragmites australis* is native to Michigan, an invasive, non-native, variety is becoming widespread.

This variety:

- Crowds out native plants/animals
- Blocks shoreline views
- Reduces access for swimming, fishing, and hunting
- Potentially creates fire hazards from dry plant material

Treatment Options

- Phragmites can be controlled using an integrated pest management approach which includes herbicide treatment and could be followed up by a mechanical removal (such as cutting or mowing), and annual maintenance.
- Herbicide treatment for phragmites usually occurs before the first frost of the year, in September or October.

West Nile Virus

What is West Nile Virus and how does it spread?

- West Nile virus (WNV) is a seasonal epidemic in North America that flares up in the summer and continues into the fall. It can infect humans, birds, horses, and some other mammals. In a small number of people infected by the virus, the disease can be serious, even fatal.
- Most often spread to humans by the bite of an infected mosquito. Whenever mosquitoes are active, there is a risk of getting WNV; however, the risk is highest from late July through September.

Collection Event Best Practices



Pre-register and pay applicable fees at NoHaz.com* (registration opens about three weeks prior to each collection event)



Due to the increasing costs of proper Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) disposal, please attend only one collection event this year, if possible



Bring HHW only—we will NOT accept business, institution or contractor waste



Separate HHW in your vehicle into three types:
1. Paint 2. Electronics 3. All other HHW*



Clearly separate HHW from other items that should remain in your vehicle



Bring acceptable HHW** only; liquids must be in sealed, leakproof five-gallon containers or smaller



Present your driver's license or other proof of residency and your registration ticket (either a printed or digital copy)



Remain in your vehicle at all times

*If you are unable to register online, registration forms will be available onsite. If fees are applicable, please pay with cash or a check (written out to Oakland County NoHaz).

**Chemicals, motor oil, fertilizers, batteries, syringes, etc.

ALARM SAFETY TIPS

From Your Building Inspector



The Sound of Safety

What is the most important thing to remember when installing a smoke alarm or carbon monoxide alarm?

Location, location, location!

Smoke Alarm Safety

- Install at least one smoke alarm in every bedroom, outside of each sleeping room area and on each level of a multi-level building.
- Test each smoke alarm regularly.
- Keep batteries fresh by replacing them annually.
- Check the manufacturer date on your smoke alarm. Replace if it is over 10 years old.



Smoke alarms can't help you unless they are functional and you can hear them. Building safety codes require smoke alarms. Contact your local building safety department for more information.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) Alarm Safety

- Install a CO alarm in the hallway outside of each sleeping room area and in bedrooms containing fuel burning appliances or fireplaces.
- Test each CO alarm regularly in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- Permanently wired or plug-in CO alarms should have a battery backup. Keep batteries fresh by replacing them annually.

CO alarms can't help you unless they are functional and you can hear them. Building safety codes require CO alarms in all dwelling units that contain a fuel-fired appliance and dwelling units that have an attached garage. Contact your local building safety department for more information.

IMPORTANT TIPS

To Remember For Fire
Safety And Awareness



- 1** Put a smoke alarm on every level of your home and outside each sleeping area. Put a smoke alarm inside every bedroom.
- 2** Make sure your smoke alarms work. Test your smoke alarms. When you push the test button, you should hear a loud noise. If you don't hear the noise, you need a new battery or a new alarm.
- 3** Make sure the smoke alarm always has a good battery. Put a new battery in the alarm every year.
- 4** Smoke alarms with long-life batteries will work for up to 10 years. You do not change the battery.
- 5** Smoke alarms do not last forever. Replace every 10 years. Newer smoke alarms provide the 10 year date.
- 6** Tell your family what to do if they hear the smoke alarm. Make an escape plan so everyone knows how to get out fast. Pick a meeting place outside the home where everyone will meet. Some children and older adults cannot hear the smoke alarm when they are sleeping. Make a plan for how to wake them up. Practice your escape plan with everyone in your family two times each year.
- 7** Install home fire sprinklers in your home. Home fire sprinklers and working smoke alarms greatly increase your chance of surviving a fire. Sprinklers are affordable and they can increase your property value and lower your insurance rates.
- 8** Portable heaters should be avoided but where used they need their space. Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away.

If you live in an area where homes are located in or close to forests or vegetation areas, you should think about the following safety tips.

- 9** Install 1/8 inch or smaller, noncombustible corrosion-resistant mesh screening that cannot burn on attic/soffit vents and around wood decks to keep out embers. Install spark arrestors on fire place chimneys or wood stove vents.
- 10** Keep all items that can burn away from your home. Clean leaves from your gutters. Clear dead leaves and branches from shrubs and trees.

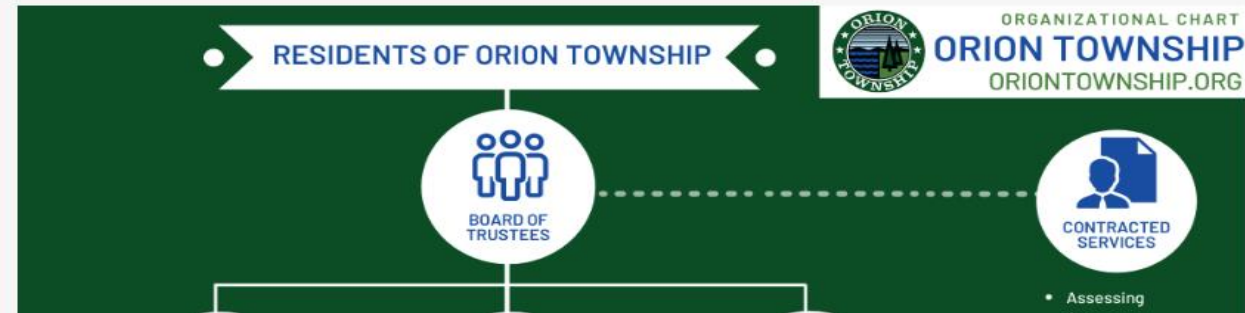

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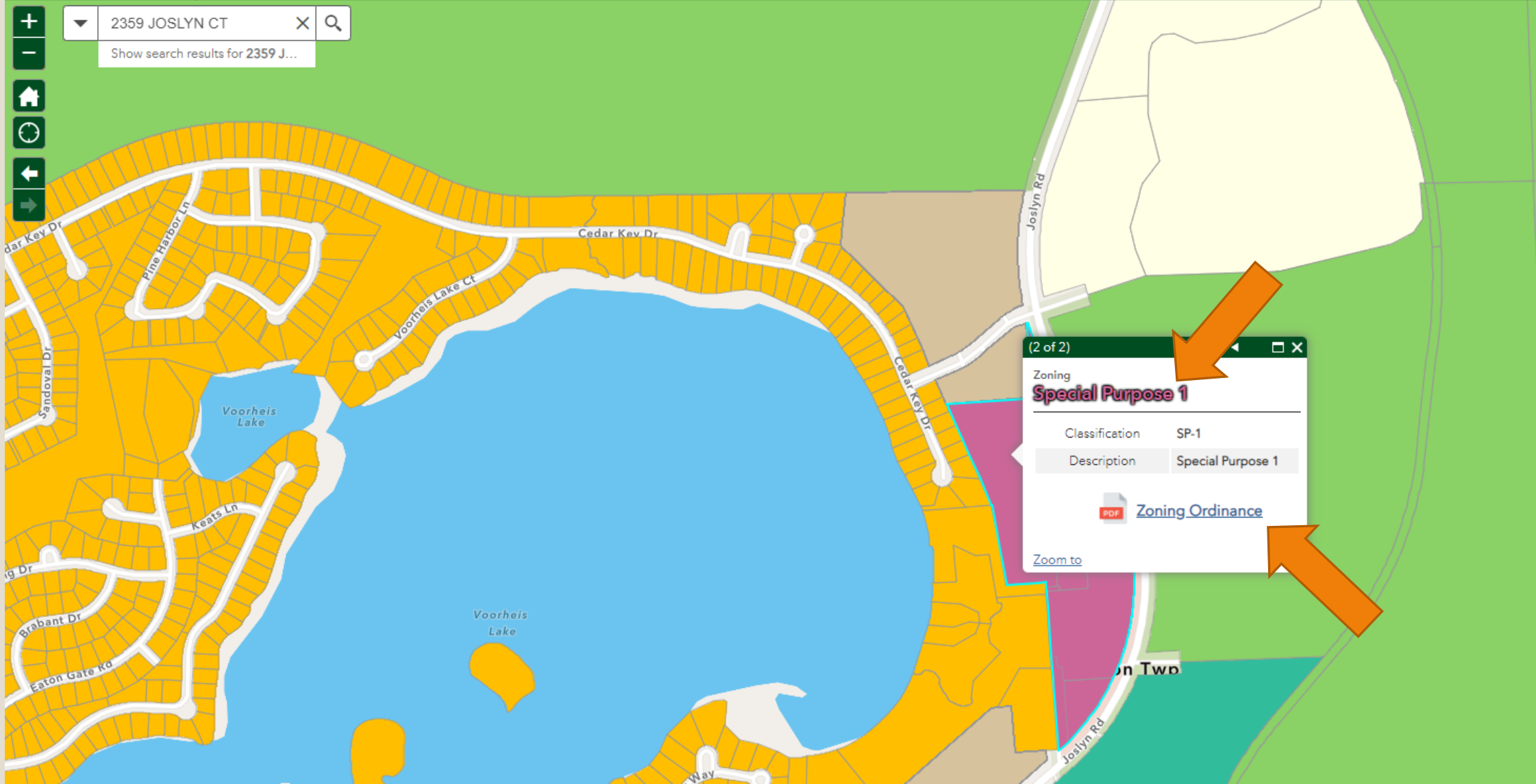

Article XXI Special Purpose 1 (SP-1)

- 4. All landscaping and screening shall be maintained in an attractive, litter-free, safe, and healthy condition. Maintenance of all landscaping shall be of sufficient frequency to prevent overgrowth and deterioration from the original condition.
- 5. The landscaped greenbelt required along with the perimeter of the parcel may be reduced in width or waived by the Planning Commission when the parcel abuts commercial/office or industrially zoned property and when existing off-street parking, drives and/or structures are located within the setback area. The Planning Commission may, at their discretion, modify or waive certain landscaping requirements in accordance with the considerations outlined in Section 27.05. *(amended 01.30.06, 09.16.03)*
- E. Sign Regulation. All signs shall comply with the standards set forth in Orion Township Sign Ordinance No. 153. *(amended 10.08.98, 02.21.06)*
- F. Lighting Regulations. *(amended 04.27.00)*
 - 1. A lighting plan shall be submitted with all site plans, as set forth in Section 27.11 of this Ordinance. All other Zoning Ordinance regulations shall apply unless otherwise noted in this Ordinance.
 - 2. Exterior site lighting shall be fully shielded and directed downward to prevent off-site glare.
 - 3. Site illumination on properties adjacent to residential properties shall not exceed 0.3 foot-candle along property lines, or 1.0 foot-candle along non-residential property lines. Parking lot lighting shall be governed by Section 27.11.
- G. Public Road Access. Any use developed or proposed within this district shall have direct access to an internal roadway having a right-of-way of at least sixty (60) feet. This internal roadway shall have direct access to a dedicated public road having an existing or planned minimum right-of-way of at least eighty-six (86) feet.
- H. Utilities. If possible, all utilities servicing the buildings or structures shall be buried underground.
- I. Covered Trash Areas.
 - 1. Covered trash receptacles, surrounded on three (3) sides by masonry brick-type walls one (1) foot higher than the receptacle shall be provided in the rear yard for use by businesses in the district.
 - 2. The fourth side of the enclosed trash receptacle area shall be equipped with an opaque lockable gate that is the same height as the masonry brick wall.
 - 3. The Planning Commission may, at their discretion, waive the requirements for a covered trash receptacle as described herein, if, after considering the nature of the operation being proposed, the Commission determines that the amount of trash generated can be adequately disposed of without use of an outside trash receptacle. *(amended 01.30.06)*
- J. Loading and Unloading.
 - 1. Loading and unloading areas shall be located in the rear or side yard of a non-residential district.
 - 2. Loading and unloading areas shall not be located where they will interfere with parking or obstruct ingress or egress.
 - 3. All loading and unloading areas shall be in conformance with the requirements set forth in Section 27.04 of this Ordinance.
- K. Performance Guarantee Requirement. The Planning Commission shall require a performance guarantee to be deposited with the Township Clerk in accordance with the provisions set forth in Section 30.09, to ensure that necessary and required improvements proposed on the site plan will be completed. *(amended 08.13.16)*

Article XXI Special Purpose 1 (SP-1)

- 2. No accessory building or structure shall exceed two thousand (2,000) square feet in area or twenty-five (25) feet in height.
- 3. Accessory buildings or uses shall be located on the same parcel as the principal use.
- 4. Maximum square footage of all accessory buildings shall not exceed forty thousand (40,000) square feet.

Section 21.03 – Required Conditions *(amended 07.16.18)*

All activities and uses in this District shall comply with the following required conditions, except where an existing building is legally in nonconformance with certain conditions, or where a variance from the conditions has been legally granted by the Zoning Board of Appeals. *(amended 01.30.00)*

- A. Site Plan Approval. The proprietor shall submit a site plan for approval pursuant to the requirements set forth in Section 30.01 of the Zoning Ordinance.
- B. Minimum Parcel Size and Maximum Lot Coverage.
 - 1. The minimum development area shall be ten (10) acres.
 - 2. Buildings and structures shall not cover more than thirty percent (30%) of the lot area.
- C. Off-Street Parking.
 - 1. One (1) parking space for each two hundred (200) square feet of gross floor area of the principal use structures and buildings shall be provided within the development. Restaurants shall require one (1) parking space for each one hundred (100) square feet of gross floor area. *(amended 08.06.07)*
 - 2. The Planning Commission may, at their discretion, modify the numerical requirements for off-street parking, based on evidence provided by the applicant that indicates that another standard would be more reasonable, because of the level of current or future employment and/or the level of current or future customer traffic. *(amended 01.30.06)*
 - 3. No parking area or driveway shall be closer than twenty (20) feet to an adjacent property line.
 - 4. Driveways and parking areas shall be curbed and consist of hard-surfaced concrete, blacktop, or equivalent as approved by the Planning Commission.
 - 5. All off-street parking shall conform to the standards set forth in Section 27.04 of this Ordinance.
 - 6. The required setback for parking may be reduced in width or waived by the Planning Commission when the parcel abuts commercial/office, or industrially zoned property, and when existing off-street parking, drives, and/or structures are located within the setback area. *(amended 09.16.03)*
- D. Landscaping.
 - 1. A landscape plan shall be submitted to the Planning Commission for approval. The landscape plan shall specify plant materials and landscape treatment, based on the requirements of Section 27.05 of this Ordinance for such items. This landscape plan shall be part of, or accompany, the site plan.
 - 2. A landscaped screen, at least ten (10) feet in width, shall be provided along the entire perimeter of an SP-1 District, except where ingress and egress drives are located.
 - 3. The off-street parking areas and driveway accesses to said parking areas shall be screened from view from any adjoining residential property. Such screening shall consist of earth berms, permanent walls, or evergreen landscaping, subject to approval of the Planning Commission.

Article XXI Special Purpose 1 (SP-1)

- L. Safety Paths. Construction of safety paths for pedestrian use and use by non-motorized vehicles shall be required in conjunction with the development of all parcels in this zoning district. The safety paths shall conform to the specifications outlined in Section 27.06 and Ordinance No. 97. *(amended 01.05.87, 02.03.03)*
- M. Tree Preservation Regulations. The tree permit requirements apply to developments in this District, according to the terms of Section 27.12. *(amended 08.03.00)*
- N. Wetland Setbacks. The wetland setback requirements apply to all developments in this District, according to the terms of Section 27.17. *(added 09.17.07)*

- A. Commercial Uses:

Article XXI Special Purpose 1 (SP-1)

Section 21.00 – Preamble

Special Purpose 1 (SP-1) Districts are intended to provide for a mixture of residential and commercial uses in one (1) location or in one (1) building. Furthermore, a primary purpose of this District is to preserve and permit one-of-a-kind mixed-use developments that are located in farm buildings and similar buildings that have converted from their original use. The District also provides for new mixed-use developments in new buildings. It is intended that all Special Purpose 1 Districts have the following characteristics:

- A. They should consist of one (1) or more buildings, unique because of their history, design, or original use, which are similar in nature and capable of attracting patrons from the metropolitan area.
- B. They should be isolated from other commercial districts.
- C. They should be isolated from other residential districts.
- D. Within the Special Purpose 1 District, the commercial activities should be located on the ground floor where such activities are readily accessible to the general public. Residential uses should be located on upper floors or in locations where the disruption from commercial activity is minimal.
- E. The Special Purpose 1 District shall be served by an internal roadway that has a right-of-way of at least sixty (60) feet. *(amended 08.29.00)*
- F. The internal road should have direct access to a collector or major thoroughfare that has an existing or proposed right-of-way of at least eighty-six (86) feet.

Section 21.01 – Use Matrix *(added 07.16.18)*

Uses Permitted by Right shall be permitted subject to the standards and requirements set forth herein. Special Uses shall be permitted subject to the standards and requirements set forth herein and subject to the standards and approval requirements as provided for in Section 30.02. Accessory Uses shall be permitted subject to the standards and requirements set forth herein and in Section 27.02. The Planning Commission may allow uses of a similar nature to those listed below, in accordance with Section 27.02E, provided that such uses will not create adverse impacts to surrounding uses.

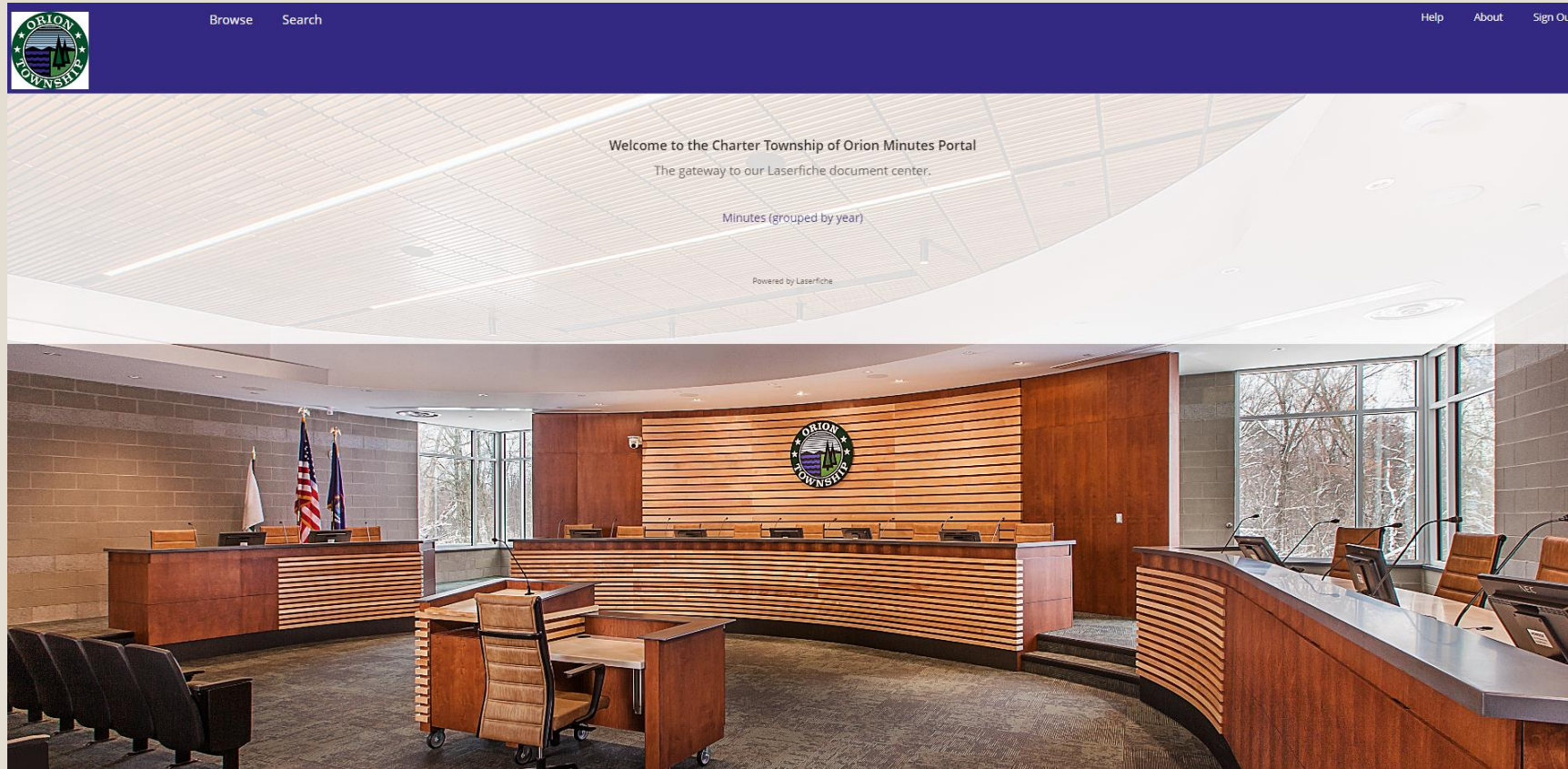

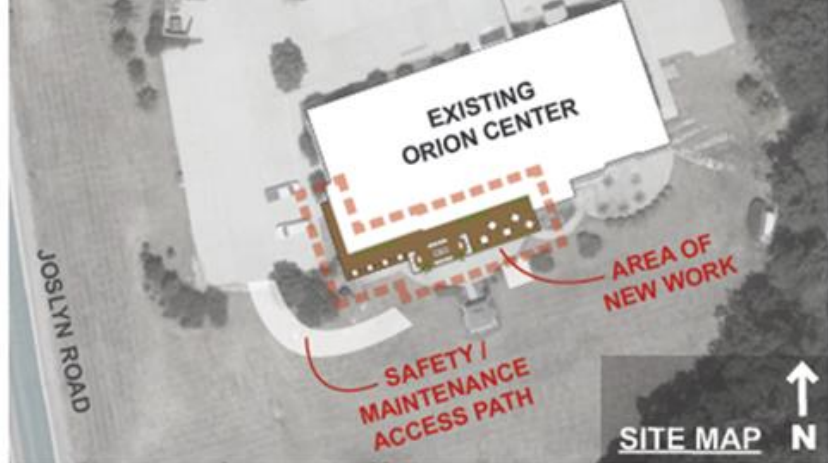

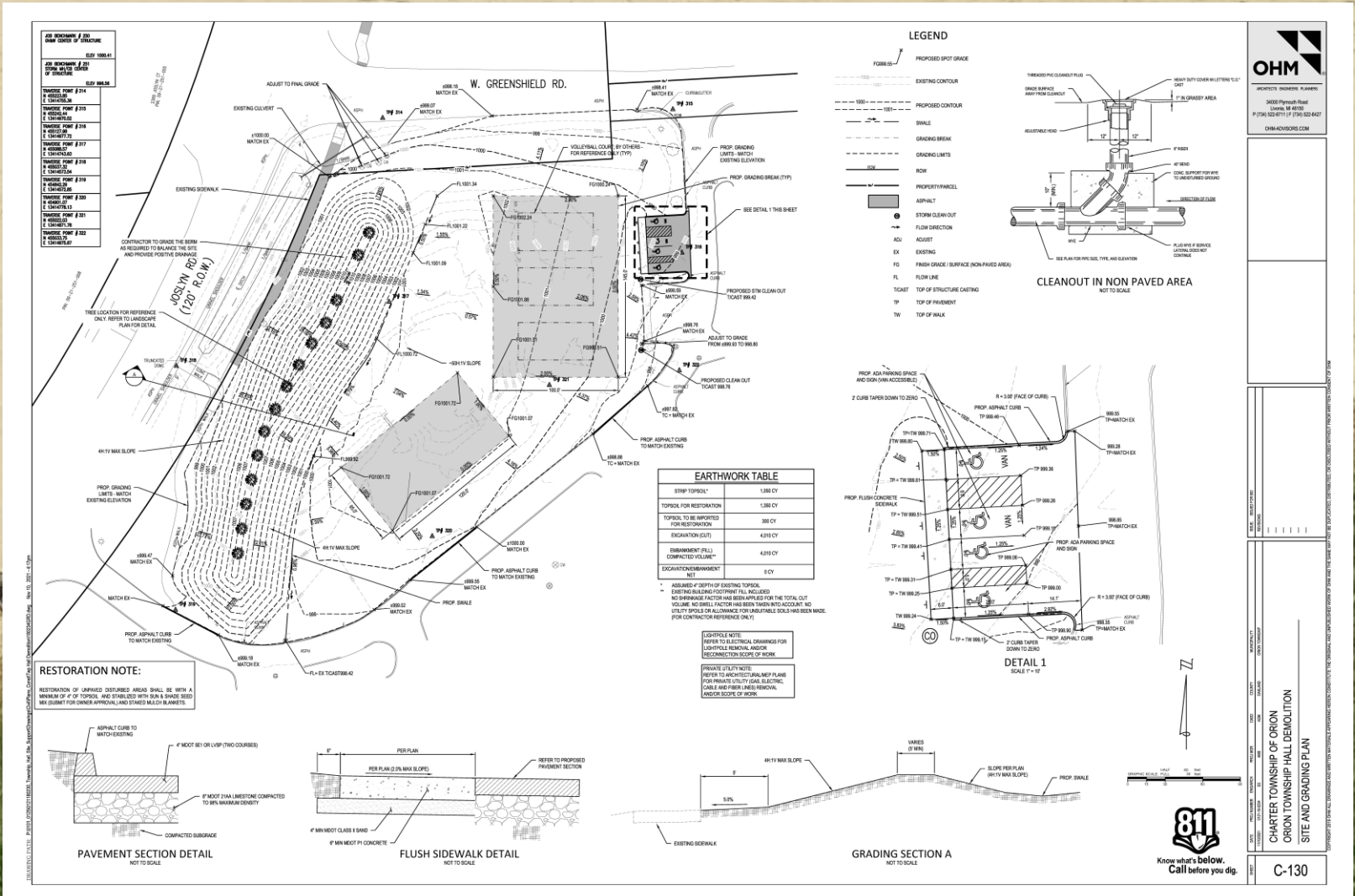
